This year soundLINCS launched New Tricks Older Adults Music Service across Lincolnshire. New Tricks is an exciting and inclusive programme, facilitated by soundLINCS to establish, grow and sustain groups for over 50s. It is funded by Arts Council England and the Postcode Community Trust.

2016/17 has seen over ten different taster groups set up for participants to engage with new musical techniques, develop skills, and meet like-minded people who love music.

Groups have included folk, rhythm and blues, handbells, drumming, and many more.

Alternative Curriculum

In November soundLINCS began working in five Lincolnshire settings within **Springwell Academy**; education establishments for excluded young people. The project has improved group work, collaboration and developed musical skills, with several young people achieving their **Discover Arts Award**.

Making Noise

soundLINCS' Making Noise workshops for children and young people with disabilities and sensory impairments and their families continued in five locations across Lincolnshire. The Making Noise Festival, our online sharing platform celebrates the achievements and creativity of young people.

Download, part of Lincolnshire Music Education Hub's Mashup programme, has worked with almost 250 pupils across 10 settings in the last year. It explores a wide range of digital technologies and processes to create original music tracks with one class over the course of six weeks.

soundLINCS FundC

As a Youth Music key strategic organisation, soundLINCS have continued delivering and developing our exciting FundC programme, one of only 13 organisations nationally running the project. It is a three year project of music workshops, training, advocacy and research focusing on our 'Inquiring Minds Process[®]' across five diverse strands.

Music provision provided to almost 500 young people within the Youth Justice system through group sessions and 1-2-1s, with almost 40 original tracks created.

Information and Sharing Practice First Notes App

This year soundLINCS launched First Notes a free music resource app for use in Early Years settings or by parents and carers at home. The App links with the areas of learning and development that are covered by the Early Years Foundation Stage and contains over 60 unique musical activities.


